If Peter had stayed behind at the well, instead of Jesus.

This assignment imagines a conversation between Sammi, a vulnerable woman, and Pete, a man she meets.

In the 'Take 1' version, Pete makes errors, shown **in bold**. These often end the conversation, so the bold sections rewind and are replaced with better responses, which are consolidated in 'Take 2'. Pete and Sammi's thoughts and actions are shown [in italics]. Comments are in the side bar.

In the first version, Pete is oblivious to Sammi's unspoken messages and often responds inappropriately. He approaches the conversation with an agenda and is repeatedly distracted by either his own interests or by Sammi's tentative attempts to avoid uncomfortable topics. Pete is embarrassed by silence and misses opportunities for deepening the conversation. At several points the conversation ends because Sammi storms off, offended.

In the second version, Pete involves God in the encounter - before, during and after — and so sees Sammi through God's eyes as a child of God worthy of forgiveness and restoration. Pete is aware of the effect of his presence on the meeting and of his biases and assumptions. He is careful to maintain propriety and treats Sammi with respect throughout. Pete is sensitive to Sammi's tone of voice and posture, and picks up unspoken messages. When he senses that she is feeling particularly vulnerable, he takes steps to show that he is not a threat. He does not attempt to steer Sammi in any direction and is careful not to condemn her past choices. He reflects on the meeting afterwards.

Only by avoiding all the pitfalls of Take 1 does Pete bring God's healing and restoration to Sammi's life. He models the patience and acceptance that we see of God with his people (eg Ps, 103:8), and Sammi becomes aware of the need to change her life without external pressure. Sammi learns to see herself as God sees her, dearly loved and worthy of forgiveness.
